PFC. AUBREY "PAT" EVANS, 22, son of Mrs. C. E. Evans, Route 5; Murray, was drafted April 28, 1942. He wained at Camp Bowie, Tex., and went overseas in December, 1942, with Co. "C" Combat Engineers. Pfc. Evans served in North Africa, Sicily, and Italy, where he is now, and has the ETO ribbon with battle stars.



PFC. ORVAL RICHARD EVANS, son of Mrs. Sally Evans, Route 5, Murray, was drafted from this county July 30, 1941. After training 14 months in the States, he was sent to North Africa, England, and France, where he was wounded June 29, 1944. 
PVT. RAYMON M. EVITTS, son of Mrs. Rubye Evitts, Hazel, was drafted in March, 1944.
