Fight(8) B-24's shot down 1233-1242 hours, four at 1244 hours, one at 1300 hours-about twenty chutes seen-jumps not delayed.

2nd Lt. Donald B. Elliott 0-817643 A/C 482 M/

1245-Hannover-three B-24's from our group seen to go down-sky full of chutes.

2nd Lt. Harold L. Fandell 0-627771 A/C 164 J/

1245 hours-one plane from this group go down after attack.
B-24 073 Bar B (Pilot-Bennett)-came up and joined lead squadron-then slid under-neath-Martin turret missing-large hole in wing-last seen at 1258 hours still losing distance.

1st Lt. William A. Greer 0-606255 A,'C 462 I/

Two A/C from high squadron - left wing came off - 3,000 feet below formation - 3 chutes 22,000 feet - Wing blew up - possibly two chutes.

lat Lt. Howard D. Hunter 0-764681 A/C 156 F

One ship from low squadron - 3 chutes - one ship at 3 o'clock downed by 190 - no chutes.

1st Lt. William B. Martin 0-697663

Two B-24's at target out of control - 2 chutes from one.

Five B-24's go down out of the high squadron.

Five B-24's seen blow up or peel out of Low Squadron. 2 chutes seen from ship flying no. 3 in lead element low squadron. 6 other B-24's down about 15-20 chutes seen.

1237 hours - Two B-24's were seen to go down in flames. Total of 9 chutes seen at 1237 1/2 at vicinity of target. 1240 hours - 2 B-24's were reported to go down - At 1251 A/O 107 (Pilot-Weitz) and 485 K (Pilot-Butler) went down.

It is requested that Sergeant Peiffer be interrogated with reference to any information he may know concerning the whereabouts of Second Lieutenant Michael Krivonak. 2. Lieutenant Krivonak was the co-pilot of the bomber of which Sergeant Peiffer was the tail gunner, and was reported missing 26 November 1944, on a mission to Misburg, Germany. 3. # PETITION Personally appeared before me, the undersigned, authority for administering oaths in cases of this character, one Kenneth M. Peiffer, Staff Sergeant, 13158746, Detachment of Patients, AAF Convalescent Hospital, St. Petersburg, Florida, and being duly sworn according to law, deposes and says: On 26 November 1944, I was a member of 491st Bomb Group, 854th Bomb Squadron. On that date we were ordered to bomb a target in Misburg, Germany. Second Lieutenant Michael Krivonak was the co-pilot of my ship when we embarked on this mission, and the last time I saw him was shortly before takeoff. I did not see him at any time thereafter because I was the tail gunner and he was all the way up front. While on the way to the target but before we reached it, our plane was shot down by enemy air-craft. Due to direct hits upon the ship, the interphone system was shot away and the plane caught fire in my vicinity, and for that reason could not see anything that was going on up front. It was at this time that I bailed out through the tail. As I descended, I noticed three or four parachutes floating, but did not know who the men were. Upon landing near Minden Germany, I was immediately captured. Several days later, while a patient in a German hospital in Minden, a German Intelligence Officer told me that he had seen seven men parachute out of the plane, but I never learned their identity. I am unable to venture any opinion comerning the whereabouts of Lieutenant Krivonak. Kenneth M. Perfer Staff Sergeant, 13158746 Sworn and subscribed to before me this 31st day of August 1945.
